Sports Premium Report 2021-2022

The Sports Premium has been granted to schools to fund additional and sustainable improvements to the provision of PE and sport of the benefit of primary-aged pupils. The aim of the Premium is to encourage the development of healthy, active lifestyles.

Allocations for the academic years 2021-2022 have been calculated using the number of pupils in years 1 to 6, as recorded in the January 2022 census, with schools with 17 or more pupils receiving £16,000 plus £10 per pupil.

At Sheen Mount, we recognise the contribution of PE to the health and wellbeing of the children. We believe that an innovative, inclusive, competitive and varied PE and sports curriculum, including extra-curricular opportunities, have a very positive influence on the concentration, attitude and academic achievement of all our children.

Sheen Mount is committed to using the sports premium to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of their physical education (PE), physical activity and sport.

As per DfE guidance, this means the school uses the premium to:

- develop or add to the PE, physical activity and sport that our school provides
- build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years

Sheen Mount uses the premium to secure improvements in the following 5 key indicators.

1. Engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity, for example by:
 - providing targeted activities and support to involve and encourage the least active children.

- encouraging active play during break times and lunchtimes by offering sports resources for use during break times and lunch times (sports balls, pogo sticks, hoops, skipping ropes, Frisbees, etc).
- raising attainment in primary school swimming to meet requirements of the national curriculum before the end of key stage 2. Every child should leave primary school able to swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 meters; use a range of strokes effectively, for example, front crawl, backstroke and breaststroke and perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations.

The school is fortunate to have a swimming pool on-site and allocated its funding heavily towards swimming classes, provided by external swimming coaches, targeted at children at risk of not meeting requirements of the national curriculum before the end of KS2. Our priority has been to ensure that pupils can swim confidently for a distance of at least 25m front and back.

- Following the easing of COVID restrictions, the school has undertaken a gradual restart of its club offering, many of which are focused on sports. Financial support will, as previously, be available for families facing hardship so that their child(ren) can participate to these extra-curricular activities at zero or close-to-zero cost to them.

2. Profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement, by:

- embedding physical activity into the school day through active travel to and from school (Walk to School Weeks), active break times and active lessons and teaching, scooter training and bike-ability training.
- *During COVID restrictions, the school had to postpone its plans to allow pupils to take on leadership or volunteer roles that support sport and physical activity within the school (such as 'sport leader' or peer-mentoring schemes). These plans will be given renewed focus in the coming school year.*

3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport, by:

- Development in OAA (Outdoor and Adventurous Activities) of a new orienteering resource. Trialed with key worker and vulnerable children through the two periods of lockdown. This training was cascaded down to class teachers.
- Hiring a qualified sports coach who works alongside teachers to enhance and extend current opportunities.
- Our qualified sports coach offers school sports / PE training opportunities to the School staff and also trainee / work experience candidates.

4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils, by:

- introducing new sports and physical activities (such as badminton, hockey, athletics, basketball), to encourage more pupils to take up sport and physical activities
- Following the easing of COVID restrictions, the school has renewed its partnership with other schools to run sport competitions and other activities from November 2021.
- Following the easing of of COVID restriction, the school has resumed its usual broad variety of extra-curricular activities after school delivered both by the school and other local sport organisations, from Spring 2022.

5. Increased participation in competitive sport, by:

- Pupils' participation in sports competitions or tournaments within the school and across the local area from September 2021, including those run by Borough Sports, Richmond Schools' Sports Partnership, NPL, other local schools and ourselves.
- In line with DfE guidance, the school has continued funding these organisations to ensure that they would be in a position to offer these services again once restrictions ease.

Impact assessment:

The impact of the sports premium spend is that sports and an active lifestyle permeates the school.

Existing activities and initiatives will be continued and built upon to continue and improve the active lifestyle promotion of the school.

In 2020/2021, swimming lessons were interrupted by COVID, thus giving Year 6 pupils far fewer lessons than originally scheduled. Notwithstanding this, 63 out of 87 pupils achieved intermediate or advanced level by June 2021, with catch-up sessions offered to the remaining 24 pupils.
