School return on the 8th March!



Reception

This week Reception have been learning about the Amazon Rainforest and looked at some of the different animals that live there. We made our own play dough and made different rainforest animals with it. We have received pictures and videos of some fantastic postcards telling us all about the different places we have visited over the last few weeks.

Year 2

This week Year 2 have been focusing really hard on their maths work where we have started to look at multiplication as adding groups of equal numbers. We have also been continuing with our London topic, looking at the cultural diversity of London and how fantastic it is to live in a city that is full of so many languages, cultures and traditions. We thought about our own background and created some posters linked to diversity.

Year 1

This week Year 1 have been looking at poetry in English and we have loved hearing them perform some pieces and write some rhyming couplets. In Maths we have been learning all about money and what the British coins are.

It has been another busy week as we have looked at Andy Goldsworthy sculptures in Art and made some lovely outdoor sculptures of our own. We have begun our new RE topic of Buddhism and are looking at Plants in Science.



Year 3

Year 3 have been learning to tell the time and have really impressed us with their understanding. The children made their own clocks to help them remember the 5 minute intervals and have even started being very accurate and telling the time to 1 minute intervals. They focussed on the language of "past" and "to", and have been using 'a.m.' and 'p.m.' to describe the time of day.

Year 4

The Year 4 teachers have been entertained by lots of fabulous acting from the children as they have been role playing scenes inspired by Michael's story in Kensuke's Kingdom. Plenty of Oscar worthy acting from the children and their soft toys has helped them to write some wonderful dialogue and to put into practice their excellent speech punctuation skills.

In science, we have begun our new topic: sound. The children have experienced how vibrations carry sound waves as they have made their own string telephones.





Year 5

This week Year 5 have been getting into a sticky mess whilst making and investigation their own glue using different substances like salt, flour and cornflour. They investigated the properties of their homemade glue by sticking together two pieces of paper or paper and card. They measured/tested the strength of the bond of the glue by attaching multiple pegs to their glued papers and holding them up in the air. The record number of pegs so far is a whopping 86! Now that is a strong glue using flour and water and is also environmentally friendly! In addition the children have continued to read Macbeth together and they were also introduce to our new geography topic, learning all about global trade. We have really enjoyed seeing the children in their tutorial groups this week where the children have been discussing the features of newspapers.







Year 6

The children in Year 6 this week have had lots of fun designing their own pieces of music using "Scratch" - an online coding website. They were able to use their coding skills to create and compose a piece of music and an animated sequence. In art, they have been inspired by the work of LS Lowry to produce their own versions of a northern industrial landscape. On Wednesday it was great for the children to join together when they took part in a class quiz.
